


The **courthouse**, finished in 1771, stood roughly at the intersection of Broad and Middle streets. By the 1860s it stood in ruins.






Christ Church, built c. 1750, is located at 320 Pollock St. It was demolished in 1824 after a second larger church was built, but the foundation was uncovered and now is an open-air chapel at the corner of Middle and Pollock streets.






Seven **wharves** were marked on Sauthier's 1769 map. One was down Pollock St. where it met the water. Where would you build a wharf here?






A **still house** stood somewhere on E Front St., possibly a hotel parking lot or gas station today. Development in the 19th and 20th centuries and large fires in the 19th century would have destroyed it.





Paid and enslaved laborers built **Tryon's Palace** in 1770. The palace burnt down in 1798, and archeologists, historians, and tradespeople helped rebuild the palace in 1959, which still stands today.



12-minute walk



The **schoolhouse,** a frame structure with brick chimneys built in 1766, stood near the intersection of Johnson and Hancock streets. The school burned down in the 1790s.
